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Introduction — Discover Ireland Beyond the Tourist Map

Ireland is a country best experienced at road level. The famous attractions matter, but so do the villages, viewpoints, cafés, winding roads and unexpected stops between them.

This guide comes from my perspective as a chauffeur. I want visitors to see the Ireland I enjoy showing passengers: the famous places, the quieter corners and the moments that happen when you leave a little room in the day.

Use this book as inspiration rather than a rigid schedule. Ireland rewards people who slow down, look around and enjoy the journey.

Chapter 1 — Planning Your Irish Adventure

Start with the journey

Ireland may look small on a map, but roads, weather and sightseeing stops can make a day longer than expected. Build breathing room into your itinerary.

Think in regions

Dublin, Cork and Kinsale, Kerry, Clare and Galway can each deserve proper time. Trying to see everything at once can mean spending too much of the holiday in the car.

Leave room for stops

Some of the best memories come from a viewpoint, village, coffee stop or photograph you did not plan for.

Weather matters

Irish weather can change quickly. Flexible plans make it easier to enjoy the day whatever the conditions.

Daz's Tip: The perfect itinerary is not necessarily the busiest one. Give yourself time to enjoy Ireland.

Chapter 2 — Dublin

Begin with the capital

Dublin is a natural starting point for many visitors. Give yourself time to walk, explore its history and enjoy its atmosphere.

Make time for the people

A road trip is not only about landmarks. Conversations, local recommendations and small discoveries often become part of the story.

Then head west or south

Once you have experienced Dublin, the open road gives you a completely different side of Ireland.

Chapter 3 — Cork & Blarney

Cork

Cork is full of character and makes a great base for exploring the south.

Blarney

Blarney Castle is one of Ireland's best-known stops and a natural addition to a Cork itinerary.

Kinsale

Kinsale is a colourful, characterful town and one of my favourite stops around Cork.

Charles Fort

I enjoy bringing passengers to Charles Fort. The history and views make it well worth the visit.

Daz's Tip: Allow time in Kinsale rather than treating it as a quick photo stop.

Chapter 4 — Killarney & The Ring of Kerry

Killarney

Killarney is a wonderful base for exploring mountains, lakes and the national park.

Moll's Gap

A great place to stop for photographs and take in the mountain scenery.

Ladies View

Another memorable viewpoint where it is worth getting out of the car and enjoying the landscape.

Waterville

Waterville is a lovely place to stop for lunch while looking out towards the sea. Dooley's is one of my recommendations for a lunch stop.

Rossbeigh Beach

For something different, horse riding on Rossbeigh Beach can be a fantastic experience.

Daz's Tip: Keep the camera ready at Moll's Gap and Ladies View.

Chapter 5 — The Dingle Peninsula

Take the coastal road slowly

The Dingle Peninsula is about scenery, villages and the Atlantic. Allow time for viewpoints and unexpected stops.

Enjoy the atmosphere

Dingle and the surrounding peninsula reward visitors who explore at an easy pace rather than rushing from one attraction to another.

The road is part of the experience

On a chauffeur journey, you can relax and concentrate on the landscape rather than navigation.

Chapter 6 — The Cliffs of Moher & County Clare

Cliffs of Moher

One of Ireland's iconic coastal experiences. Give yourself time to take in the scale of the cliffs and the Atlantic.

The Burren

The landscape around the Burren is unlike anywhere else in Ireland and makes the journey itself memorable.

Caherconnell

The Caherconnell Sheepdog Demonstration is a great experience and a chance to see traditional Irish farming skills in action.

Bunratty Castle

Bunratty Castle and Folk Park make a strong stop for visitors interested in Irish history and traditional life.

Daz's Tip: Do not rush the Clare coastline. Some of the best parts are the views between the main attractions.

Chapter 7 — Galway & The Wild Atlantic Way

Galway

Galway is lively, welcoming and a great place to experience the west of Ireland.

Salthill

A lovely place for a walk along the promenade and views across Galway Bay.

Kinvara

Kinvara is a lovely little harbour village and a great stop when travelling between Galway and Clare.

Connemara

Connemara is one of the places where the road itself becomes an attraction. The mountains, lakes and open landscape are unforgettable.

Kylemore Abbey

Kylemore Abbey is a memorable stop, with the abbey and its spectacular natural setting.

Watch for the sheep

As you drive through Connemara, you may see sheep on the road. It is part of the character of the area — just slow down and enjoy it.

Daz's Tip: Keep your eyes open in Connemara. You never quite know what will be around the next bend.

Chapter 8 — Ireland's Hidden Gems

Look beyond the headline attractions

Ireland's famous places are famous for a reason, but smaller towns and less obvious experiences can be just as memorable.

Adare

Adare is a lovely little town and a good place to slow down, walk around and enjoy the atmosphere.

Ringfinnan Garden of Remembrance

Near Kinsale is a quiet and moving place of remembrance. It is a stop for reflection rather than simply sightseeing.

Kerry Falconry

A good off-the-beaten-track experience for visitors looking for something different.

The Quiet Man

For fans of John Wayne and *The Quiet Man*, the museum and film locations around the west make an enjoyable themed stop.

Daz's Tip: Leave some space in your itinerary for the unexpected.

Chapter 9 — Your Perfect Irish Itinerary

3 Days

Choose one region and explore it properly. A focused trip can be more enjoyable than trying to cross the whole country.

5 Days

A south-west route can combine Cork/Kinsale with Killarney and Kerry, with time for scenic stops.

7 Days

A week gives you room to connect the south-west with Clare and Galway while still allowing time to enjoy the journey.

10 Days

With ten days, you can travel at a relaxed pace and combine Dublin with the south and west, adding hidden gems along the way.

The rule I recommend

Build the itinerary around experiences, not just mileage. A great lunch, viewpoint or village can be as important as the headline attraction.

Chapter 10 — Travelling Ireland in Comfort

More than getting from A to B

Private chauffeur travel means you can relax while someone else handles the roads, timing and practical details.

A personal approach

For me, the job is about looking after people — water in the car, coffee stops, photographs, recommendations and helping when something unexpected happens.

Enjoy the road

2. Shirley's Fish & Chips

A personal recommendation when visiting Charles Fort and Kinsale.

3. Ringfinnan Garden of Remembrance

A quiet and moving place near Kinsale for reflection.

4. Kerry Falconry

A different, off-the-beaten-track experience in County Kerry.

5. Horse Riding on Rossbeigh Beach

A memorable way to experience the Kerry coastline.

6. Caherconnell Sheepdog Demonstration

A great County Clare experience and a glimpse of traditional Irish farming skills.

7. Kylemore Abbey

Give yourself time to appreciate both the abbey and its spectacular setting.

8. Connemara sheep

Keep your eyes open and slow down — sheep on the road are part of the character of Connemara.

9. The Quiet Man & Salthill

Film fans can enjoy The Quiet Man Museum and locations; Salthill is a lovely Galway stop for a walk by the sea.

10. Waterville, Moll's Gap, Ladies View, Bunratty, Adare & Kinvara

These are the kinds of stops that make a road trip feel personal: lunch with a sea view, photographs from mountain viewpoints, historic places and charming towns.

Daz's Tip: Do not rush Ireland. Sometimes the best stop is the one you did not plan.

I'm not just driving people around Ireland. I'm helping them experience it.

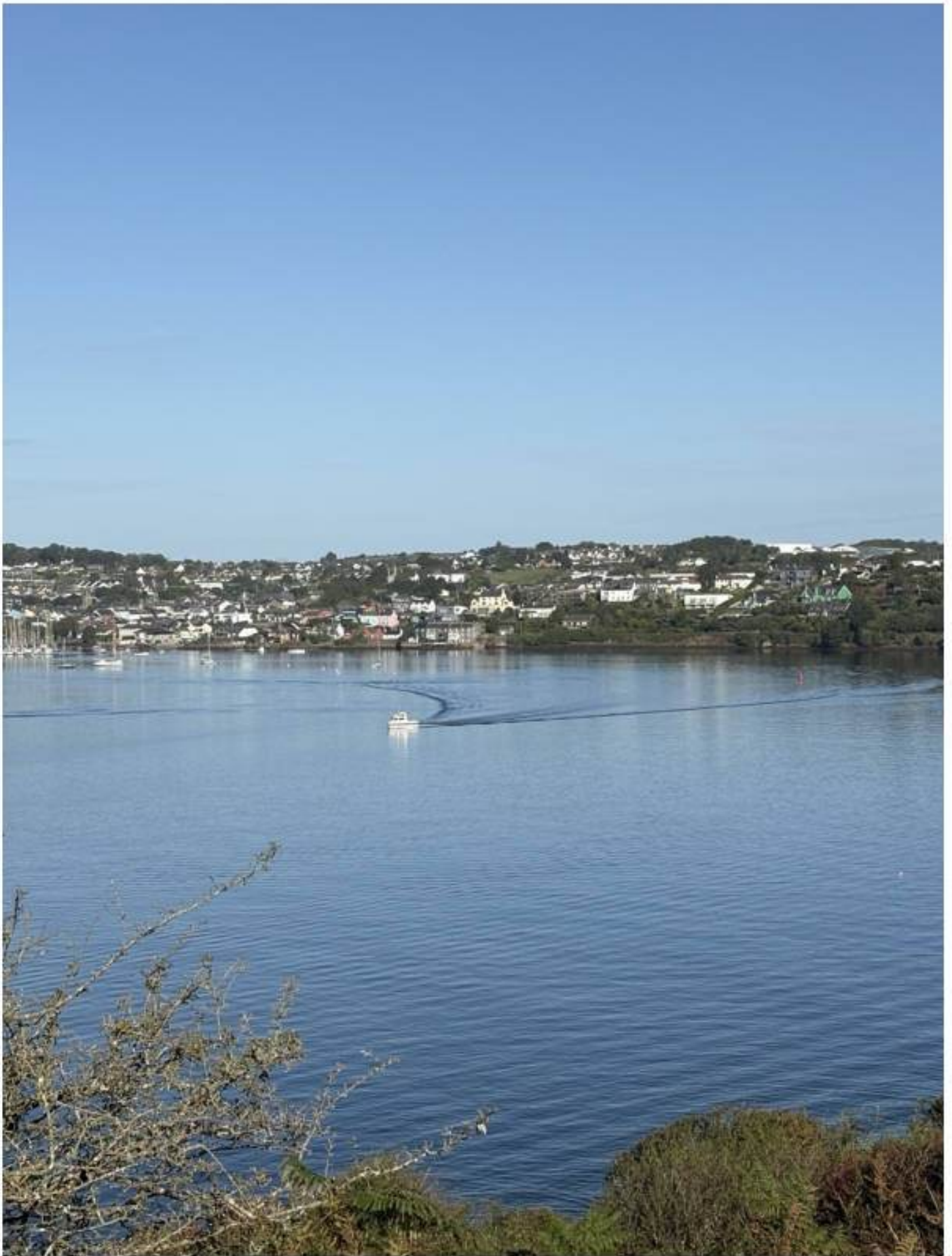
